This home had residents,mentally challenged, dwarfed in stature, but wanting to do daily farm chores to be appreciated by someone.

We all want to feel worth and value, to be needed... The residents were called kids at any age and were always offering to wash staff members cars. Which they did! Doing a sparkling job too! Staff would always give them some change which was promptly spent at the candy store.
